I've been thinking about how blessed we are to have Karen cater for a range of dietary requirements at Carey lunches. I particularly appreciate the vegan option because I was vegan at a time when no one provided for us.

I also note the biblical foundation for a new generation of Christian vegans. I never had that foundation—quite the opposite, in fact. While still a new Christian I came upon scriptures that convinced me to abandon veganism. I wanted to obey God but I struggled to take my first mouthful of animal flesh in ten years. I realised that my struggle was not out of concern for animals but out of reluctance to let go of feeling morally superior. For me, eating became an act of repentance—and that trout tasted delicious.

Twenty years on, I still enjoy eating meat but greatly respect my brothers and sisters who are vegan by Christian conscience. Whether we eat or don't eat meat, at Carey we all eat with thankfulness to God—and with thankfulness to Karen for catering to us all.
